# LETTER FROM BOARD CHAIR AND PRESIDENT/CEO

Volunteers of America Delaware Valley is pleased to present our 2008 annual report.

This summary of 12 months in our life of this organization mainly takes the form of numbers, statistics and lists. All of these are important, to be sure. But none of them can tell the story of what we do and why we do it as eloquently as, say, the smiles in and around the new playground at Eleanor Corbett House.

This terrific project at our family shelter in Gloucester County, NJ exemplifies the rich range of business and community partnerships with which we are blessed. The Major League Baseball Players Trust, a longtime supporter of Volunteers of America nationwide, provided a \$10,000 grant that enabled us to leverage more support. New corporate partners such as the Kramer Beverage Company and the Harrison Beverage Company joined with us as we welcomed the support of volunteers from nearby Rowan University – and as Greenlane Contracting did a major piece of the work for us at a considerable discount.

With the global economy declining, all sorts of partnerships proved essential in 2008. Consider the relationships we have built with employers in our region; despite the tough times, we were able to help 615 of our clients get jobs during the 2008 Fiscal Year. We have nurtured relationships with unions as well: In April, 2008, Council 71 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), representing 47 union locals in Southern New Jersey, announced an alliance with our Homeless Prevention Program.

Meanwhile, the year also saw Leavenhouse in Camden, NJ join our family of programs and services, strengthening our commitment to the community in the process. And we also hosted a visit from New Jersey Governor Jon Corzine, who chose our Hope Hall facility in Camden as the backdrop for announcing his administration's new effort to reduce recidivism.

Surely no partnership is more essential than the one we have with you, the reader of this annual report. Whether a major donor or a new supporter, whether a longtime employee or a veteran volunteer, you deserve our gratitude. You have helped us make a difference in the lives of many thousands of men, women and children. On their behalf, we thank you.

## HOUSING & SUPPORTIVE SERVICES

### Agapé House

Located in downtown Somerville, Agapé House is a 60-bed shelter providing temporary housing and case management to homeless families and individuals. Necessities such as food, clothing, child enrichment, and transportation are available.

### Aletha R. Wright “Vision of Hope” Center

Located in the commercial shipping hub of Camden, the center serves 74 single adult homeless men in **Emergency Shelter** and **Transitional Living** programs. These programs are designed to move each individual through phases which concentrate on addressing basic needs, life skills, employment and housing. The **Safe Haven** program provides a safe and secure environment to 25 men coping with behavioral health challenges.

### Amani House

Located in the heart of Trenton, this 25-bed transitional housing program serves single adult homeless men. This supportive housing program provides a secure environment, workshops, meals, case management and support to those in need.

### Anna M. Sample Complex

Located just outside downtown Camden, the complex has a **Family Shelter** program providing temporary emergency shelter for 65 residents. The facility accommodates families and single women. The **Safe Haven** program provides a safe and secure environment to 8 homeless single women coping with behavioral health challenges. The **Transitional Living for Families** program provides specialized housing for 5 homeless women with dependency issues, and for their children. The goal is to provide services up to one year while enabling mothers to focus on their treatment, develop better parenting skills and regain control of their lives.

### Eleanor Corbett House

Located in a beautiful lakeside setting, this 50-bed **Family Shelter** houses homeless families and individuals. A daily congregate meal, workshops, tutoring, special events, transportation and supportive services are provided to residents during their stay. The **Safe Haven** program provides a safe and secure environment to 8 homeless single women coping with behavioral health challenges.

### Homeless Prevention

Located at St. Paul’s United Methodist Church in Thorofare, the Homeless Prevention Program aims to prevent homelessness by providing basic assistance to low-income residents of Gloucester County. Assistance provided includes food, clothing, rent, mortgage and utility payments.

## AFFORDABLE HOUSING

### Chance II

## CORRECTIONS SERVICES

Volunteers of America Delaware Valley provides evidence-based treatment interventions to clients in an effort to reduce the risk of re-offending and promote public safety.

### Fletcher House

This program is an 84-bed residential community release program for adult male offenders. Clients are required to either work or attend school full-time while addressing their treatment needs such as problem solving, substance abuse prevention and job readiness.

### Garrett House

This program is an 47-bed residential community release program for adult female offenders. Clients are required to either work or attend school full-time while addressing their treatment needs such as problem solving, substance abuse prevention and job readiness.

### Hope Hall

This is a 175-bed residential community release program focusing on treatment of adult male offenders. Clients participate in intensive cognitive skills training, substance abuse prevention, work place readiness and emotions management for the first 90 days. Upon completion of treatment intervention, clients are required to work or attend school full-time to prepare for release.

### Day Reporting Center

This is a 90 day program for 60 adult male and female parolees who are living in the community. The CRC focuses on cognitive skills training, substance abuse prevention, education and job readiness to assist clients in achieving success on parole.

### PROMISE

PROMISE (Program for Returning Offenders with Mental Illness Safely and Effectively) serves to transition offenders with mental illness from incarceration to the community. The PROMISE team assists clients in finding employment, participating in treatment, linking with mental health services, and discharge planning.

This juvenile re-entry program serving youth 14 to 18 years of age returning to Camden City. Ready4Work provides case management, education and employment assistance, and faith-based mentoring.

## BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROGRAM

### Integrated Services Supporting Independence (ISSI)

This 14-bed residential program is based on an integrated approach to treatment and rehabilitation, reflecting a person-centered philosophy and geared towards recovery. ISSI offers a continuation of treatment and extended aftercare reintegration services with intensive case management to the mentally ill client who has been diagnosed with co-occurring disorders.

### Integrated Services Supporting Independence (ISSI)

#### Step Down

This 9-bed residential program is based on an integrated approach to treatment and rehabilitation, reflecting a person-centered philosophy and self-sufficiency geared towards recovery. The Step Down program offers a continuation of treatment and extended aftercare reintegration services with case management to the mentally ill client who has been diagnosed with co-occurring disorders and ready to embrace a less restricted environment.

## DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES PROGRAM

### Specialized MR Services (SMRS) Program

Located in Southeastern Pennsylvania, the SMRS program provides a structured and facilitative environment for developmentally disabled individuals. The program creates an environment that facilitates acquisition of daily living skills, social skills and psychiatric intervention, as well as logistics and support in exploring and pursuing vocational, recreational, educational, and spiritual pursuits. The SMRS Program is invested in identifying opportunities for social integration, in particular, the creation of social capital. Residences vary from individuals supported in their own apartments to homes with a maximum of three individuals.

# *SPOTLIGHT ON CAROLYN BALLARD*

Board member and board chair emeritus Carolyn M. Ballard says her decade of service to Volunteers of America Delaware Valley has been akin to a "love at first sight relationship."

The feeling is mutual.

"Carolyn Ballard is an extraordinary human being. She leads by example and advocates for those we serve with a passion and energy that exemplifies her leadership and commitment," says President and CEO Daniel L. Lombardo. "She has led our organization to new heights in the way the Board of Directors functions and has encouraged us to implement more and more outcome based services and programs. Carolyn has given us more than words can express."



Ballard, the "Expecting Success" Project Coordinator for New Jersey Health Initiatives, was the executive director and chief operating officer of the Camden NJ division of Virtua Health when she first encountered our organization in the late 1990's.

"A former board member talked to me about calling on Dan about potential partnerships, because we were planning to restructure the Camden division, and we wanted the building to continue to provide services to the community," Ballard recalls. "It was almost love at first sight in the sense of my view of Volunteers of America Delaware Valley, and wanting to become a part of it in some way."

A longtime resident of Philadelphia, Ballard - a mother of two and grandmother of three - says she has been impressed by our organization's professionalism.

"One thing that comes to mind is the true sincerity of the employees and the senior staff," she says. "I admire the longevity of some of the senior-level staff. Pat McKernan and Gina Williams Deas - I've watched them flourish. And I have been impressed with the human resources team.

"The staff on the front lines deals with individuals who are down on their luck and are in many cases viewed by society as less desirable. Yet this organization not only pulls up their spirits, it has a common spirit of working together - while looking at the individual they're working with as someone with dignity."

# *QUILTERS ADOPT THE MEN OF THE ALETHA R. WRIGHT CENTER*

They called their project “An Act of Kindness.”

But it was more like a labor of love.

A quilting group, “Friends of Franny,” arrived at the Aletha R. Wright Vision of Hope Center on March 21, 2008 to present hand-made quilts to residents of the Camden NJ facility.

Here’s how it came about: The previous spring, James Wynn, then the program director at Aletha Wright, made a presentation to the United Way of Camden County. A United Way representative named Christina Wyse was so impressed that she decided to launch an effort to make 25 quilts for the homeless men in the facility.

“Even though their lives may not be perfect, they are human beings, and people do care about them and love them for who they are,” Christina said.

During the March 21 ceremony, the quilters told the men that their project started with only a couple of volunteers. But as word traveled, others joined,



graciously giving up their nights and weekends to create the quilts. Volunteers included students from the Work Group in Pennsauken; employees of Lawson Fabrics and United Way of Camden County; ARI; and a member of Seven Sisters of Mullica Hill.

The quilters said they hoped the color, design and love that went into each quilt would inspire each recipient. And the men at the ceremony said they were truly touched.



## ***NJ GOVERNOR CORZINE AND COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS***

New Jersey Governor Jon S. Corzine announced the re-entry component of his anti-crime program, “A Strategy for Safe Streets and Neighborhoods,” during a visit to our Hope Hall facility in Camden NJ. The governor said the strategy will help prisoners successfully transition back into their communities.

Annually, about half of New Jersey’s prison population is released; many are arrested again within five years. But at Hope Hall - a halfway house - less than one in four inmates are convicted again.

Daniel L. Lombardo, President and CEO of Volunteers of America Delaware Valley, says our success rate stems from intensive programs to address issues ranging from job readiness to anger management.

The programs include: Reasoning & Rehabilitation (cognitive skills training), SMART Recovery, Pathways to Change, Choices (substance abuse/relapse prevention training), and CALM (anger management).



Hope Hall also provides adult basic education, GED preparation, life skills programs (budgeting, goal setting, etc.), leisure and recreation programs, and motivational enhancement groups. The Family Violence Prevention Program is also available.

Hope Hall opened in 1999. It is the largest residential community release program we operate.



## ***CHRISTMAS SERVICE REVIVED***

After a 20-year hiatus, the Volunteers of America Delaware Valley Christmas service was revived in December 2007. “Joy to the World” was the theme.

Led by our Chaplain, the Rev. Crystal Snowden, the service was certainly full of “joy and exaltation” as staff, clients and friends filled the Collingswood Church of Christ.

Co-chief operating officer and minister Gina Williams Deas led the opening prayer. Ministers Mildred Samuels and Maureen Dobosz offered words of remembrance for employees who have passed on.

During the service, the Ray of Hope Praise Dancers expressed their love for the Lord through movement – and moved the congregation to frequent applause. Other guests included a life-long friend of Reverend Snowden, Mr. Kevin Wilkins, and with him the Psalmist Chorale. Minister Sheila Jones, who has volunteered her services in Corrections for more than five years, also spoke

The women from Garrett House offered poetry and Christmas songs, after which Ministers Eugene Zalewski and Patricia McKernan read from the Old and New Testaments.

The speaker for the service was President and CEO Daniel L. Lombardo, who gave testimony on how “divine intervention” brought Volunteers of America Delaware Valley from its very humble beginnings to what it is today - one of the most successful non-profit organizations in the Delaware Valley.

## ***DONATION INSPIRES PARTNERSHIPS AND PLAY***

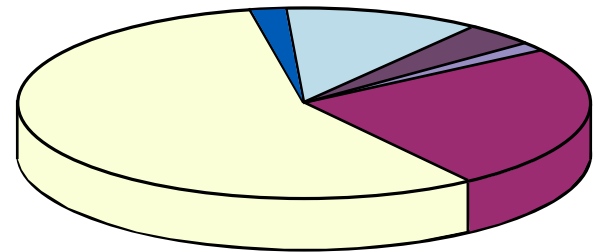
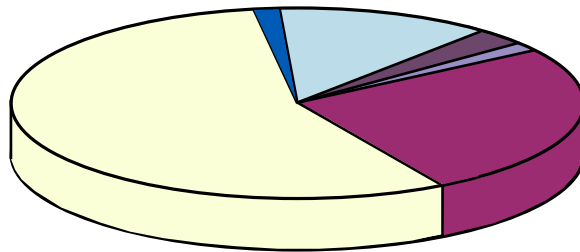
